We also continue to look for educational "pipeline" opportunities such as our dual enrollment program with St. Louis Public Schools and our Summer Adventure Academies which will be held two weeks in July: one week for middle schoolers and one week for high schoolers. These camps are a great way to expose kids and teens to technical education and give them the opportunity to see first-hand where a job in these growing fields can take them.

Ranken Graduates Largest Class In Its Long History

n Saturday, May 14 Ranken held its 2011 Commencement Ceremony at Chaifetz Arena on the campus of Saint Louis University. This year's graduating class was the largest in the College's history, with 991 students eligible to graduate and over 560 students participating in the ceremony.

The keynote speaker for the event was Congressman William Lacy Clay,

the Missouri State Congressman for the First District. Congressman Clay is a native of St. Louis and has been a long-time supporter of Ranken.

The David Ranken, Jr. award was presented to graduating Automotive Maintenance student Michael Kinder. Kinder graduated with a 4.0 GPA and an "Exceeds Expectations" in work ethic in all four semesters. He served as a student worker in the Automotive department and often helped with evening school classes. Kinder plans to pursue a Bachelor of Science degree in Automotive Technology at Southern Illinois University

at Carbondale and hopes to one day become an automotive instructor. Prior to the Commencement Ceremony, the Alumni Association held an anniversary celebration to honor Ranken graduates who were celebrating their 25, 50 and 75 year graduation anniversaries. Four alumni celebrated their silver anniversary (25 years), seven celebrated their golden anniversary (50 years) and two celebrated their diamond anniversary (75 years). Recipients were given a certificate commemorating their graduation and recognized with a pin marking the milestone.

Also during the anniversary celebration, two Ranken alumni were acknowledged for their achievements in their profession; their involvement in their community through volunteer service; and their contributions to the College. These annual awards honor Ranken graduates who through their character, leadership, service and financial support sustain the reputation of David Ranken, Jr. Congratulations to Thomas E. Wood (Carpentry 1955) and Jeffery R. Scott (Industrial Maintenance 2006) who were presented with the 2011 Distinguished Alumni Awards.

Mary Ann Lee Technology Center Project Team Has Strong Ranken Connection

hanks to major donations from Jack Taylor and Mary Ann Lee, the Mary Ann Lee Technology Center, located at Page and Newstead, will undergo completion and a remodel. Currently the building houses the High Performance Racing Technology program, the Industrial Technology program, the new Fabrication and Welding Technology lab and a large "flex space."

At the beginning of the year, open forums were held to inform employees of the project and to allow input of what should be included in the new space. Administration used that information to interview and select a contractor and an architect. HBD was selected as the project contractor and Jim Hershfelt was selected as the site superintendent. Hershfelt is a Ranken graduate and an experienced supervisor who has been with HBD for 11 years. The architect chosen was Rebecca Kleba of Chiodini Associates who is a 1995 Ranken graduate. The project manager will be Adam Chamberlain, whose son graduated from Ranken in May. Chamberlain has been very happy with his son's experience at the College and specifically requested to be involved in this project.

The project will be completed in two phases. The first phase will include 9,600 square feet of new classroom space and 4,600 square feet of flex space. Phase one also includes bathrooms and a kitchen staging area for events held in the atrium.

Plans for the second phase include a new auditorium, new entrance and additional parking. Phase one is scheduled to be completed by the start of the fall 2011 semester. Phase two will start once funding is secured.

Information Technology Welcomes Cisco VP



n Wednesday, April 6, Howard Charney, senior vice president and member of Cisco's Office of the President and Executive Staff visited Ranken's Information Technology program. Charney reports directly to Cisco CEO, John Chambers.

Charney was one of the four founders of 3Com Corporation and the founder of Grand Junction Networks. Grand Junction Networks is credited for inventing Fast Ethernet and switching. These

technologies have been instrumental to the development of the internet as we know it today. In 1995 Grand Junction Networks was purchased by Cisco.

Charney toured the IT classrooms and spoke to the students about his experiences as an engineer and as the senior vice president of Cisco. He took questions from students which ranged from his personal life to new technologies that we are going to see in the near future.

"Mr. Charney's visit was a great experience for our students," said IT instructor Alan Poettker. "For me it was really interesting to hear him talk about people we read about in our IT books as his personal friends. We were all really excited and grateful to have had him on campus."

Ranken and bioMerieux Celebrate Milestone

ast summer Ranken entered into an education and manufacturing partnership with bioMerieux to manufacture a Smart Carrier Station (SCS). The partnership not only offers students a job opportunity on campus but also prevented the loss of jobs from the U.S. to Asia. The partnership came about when bioMerieux faced a decision to consider outsourcing the manufacture of the SCS overseas. Stan Shoun, president of Ranken Technical College, asked the company to consider an alternative approach and proposed that the product could be manufactured at Ranken by student workers. The company agreed so Ranken converted space in the Mary Ann Lee Technology Center into a complete off-site work cell and created the new Education and Manufacturing Cooperative department. The department is under the charge of Vice President for Education, Don Pohl and the bioMerieux project is being led by two faculty members, Vince Holtmann and John Baima.

Student workers are charged with the responsibility for inspection of parts, complete assembly of the product and testing of functions for the electrical and mechanical components to meet quality standards and the production schedule. The students are also responsible for database tracking of the warehouse inventory. In addition to receiving pay as a part-time employee, students also receive Workforce Education college credits for the educational training.

At the end of May, the department celebrated the delivery of its 1,000th SCS unit! Congratulations to Vince Holtmann, John Baima and all of the student workers who continue to make this partnership a success.

To help celebrate the milestone, on the evening of Tuesday, May 24, two representatives from bioMerieux came to campus to visit the off-site work cell. Grace Bommarito-May, bioMerieux's purchasing

director located in St. Louis, brought Emeline Gasiglia, the company's corporate vice president for global purchasing who was visiting from France.

The two were greeted by Crystal Herron, Ranken's dean of academic affairs, Don Pohl, vice president for education and Vince Holtmann, faculty project manager. The group toured the current work-cell site

Gasiglia, who is a mechanical engineer, was very impressed with the PMT shop and commented that it reminded her of the shop she trained in while in college.

Gasiglia and Bommarito-May also had the opportunity to view the area in the Mary Ann Lee Technology Center (the old

Carpentry shop) which is slated to be the new home of the work site.

"Because of the success we have had manufacturing the Smart Carrier Systems, bioMerieux has provided us the opportunity to take on five new subassemblies," said Holtmann. "The new location, which is about 2,200 square feet will be better able to accommodate the expansion."

The new subassemblies will include power supplies used on the BacT which is an automated microbial detection system and Vitek 2 which is microbial identification system. The new projects will be added one at a time over the summer beginning with one of the BacT power supplies added on June 6. Two of the student employees are currently training at bioMerieux to prepare for transfer of manufacturing these units at Ranken.

"Ms. Gasiglia was very happy with our site and the progress we have made," said Pohl. "The company was initially worried that an off-site work cell wouldn't be efficient, but she said our response has exceeded their expectations. This is a mutually beneficial partnership and we are really excited to be able to continue to work with bioMerieux."

bioMerieux is a multinational biotechnology company headquartered in France that produces a wide range of electronic medical devices. bioMerieux has an instrumentation manufacturing facility located in Hazelwood, Mo.

This year's recipient was **Victor Pope**, a 2011 ESDT graduate. Victor also received a certificate and TRiO/SSS goodie bag which included items to help keep him warm during the mean Chicago winters as he was recently hired to work at Sargent and Lundy, LLC in Chicago, IL. During his time at Ranken, Victor has worked as at tutor in the Student Achievement Center, a Student Ambassador, served as a peer mentor for various TRiO/SSS workshops and completed TRiO's Emerging Leader's Institute.

Counselors Successful in Outlying Areas

O ver the past two years, the Admissions office has expanded their recruitment area significantly by adding counselors in Chicago and Kansas City. Current counselors have also been recruiting further out by visiting schools in Kentucky, Indiana, Arkansas and Tennessee. The opening of Walker Hall in 2009 has only supported these efforts with the opportunity to live on campus now available.

Several schools from our expanded recruitment area came to visit campus during the month of May:

- Fourteen students from East High School in the Kansas City area traveled in for a half-day visit to Ranken. The students stayed in Walker Hall the night before to get a feel for dorm life. Residents entertained them by planning a karaoke night that also included pizza and a movie. The next morning they met with Admissions to learn more about the College and programs offered then took a tour through the Automotive, Information Technology and Construction divisions. The group was treated to lunch in the dining hall then headed back to Kansas City.
- On Friday, April 29, Southwest Prep Academy from Memphis, Tennessee brought 13 students and 7 counselors/teachers to campus. "The tour went really well," said Abe Brummett, admissions counselor. "Several of the students were really excited that a school like Ranken even existed. The chaperones were very impressed as well." Seven of the students filled out applications at the end of the tour. Jeff Wilkens, who recruits in this area, plans to follow up with more presentations in that area next year.
- Fourteen students and three chaperones from Gage Park High School in the Chicago area rode the Amtrak train to St. Louis on May 10-11 to visit Ranken. The group stayed in the dorms and took a tour of the Electrical areas, Industrial Technology and Precision Machining. The group also participated in a Shadow-a-Tech day in the Automotive division.

"Its really exciting to see our efforts in these outlying areas paying off," said Mike Hawley, director of Admissions. "It can be really difficult to break out into new territory where schools and students have never even heard your name. Ranken has an outstanding reputation in the St. Louis Metro Area, now our counselors are working hard to build that reputation in their expanded territories."

Ranken Archives Continue to Grow

n February, Ranken contracted with archivist, Diane Everman, PhD to organize, preserve and catalog the many historical documents, publications, photographs and articles that have been collected over the years.

"Diane has done a great deal of work over these past few months," said Barb Edwards, Ranken's library resource center director. "When we first contracted with her we had a good size collection of items to be properly archived. Once we sent out the request to the College to send us historical items that may be in other offices, the collection more than doubled. We were really excited about all of the new items but very overwhelmed."

Everman's contract was up at the end of May and she will be

n 2009, Ranken received a four-year \$582,000 grant from the National Science Foundation (NSF) to award scholarships to students majoring in Architecture, Information Technology, Precision Machining or Industrial Technology. The grant also provides funding to develop a special enhanced program to help students during their studies at Ranken and prepare them to enter these high-tech fields or enroll in advanced degree programs. These include: faculty and peer mentoring, scholar groups, academic advising and assistance, professional development activities and career services and counseling.

The S-STEM faculty advisors kept the students very busy this semester with several programs intended to help their professional development:

Trip to Boeing

Bill Wagner (CRT 1936)

Bill Wagner (CRT 1936) has been associated with Ranken Technical College for most of his life and passed away in March at the age of 92. Mr. Wagner was an alumnus, Ranken faculty member, Carpentry department head, Golden Graduate, Top 100 Honoree and a man whose commitment to Ranken never faltered. The life of Mr. Wagner is what we hope for all of our students, alumni, friends and family. A scout leader, husband, father, grandfather and great-grandfather, Mr. Wagner left many friends and family behind to remember him especially former students from the Carpentry department.

Mr. Wagner graduated from the Carpentry program in 1936 and then spent the better part of his career teaching carpentry to others. Before returning to Ranken to teach in the 40's, Bill spent 12 years working for a variety of companies gaining valuable knowledge and experience that he eventually passed on to his students.

Bill's teaching career spanned over three decades, from 1948-1982, and

his influence on the young people who went through his program was significant. One thing that is certain. Bill is fondly remembered by his former students. To this day, former students ask about him and share stories about their favorite instructor. One of Bill's students, Tom Wood (Class of 1955), purchased a brick on the Ranken "Walk of Fame" to honor him. In 2006. Bill and Tom were able to walk together at the 50th Anniversary celebration of their graduation in the Golden Graduate Ceremony held at Ranken's annual commencement exercise. Tom

Wood was saddened when he heard of his passing. "A great instructor and friend has left us. I owe everything I know about construction to him," said Tom.

More recently Mike Weiss and Jim Newman returned to Ranken for the Carpentry Reunion held on campus last October just to visit with Mr. Wagner.

"Mr. Wagner was a perfectionist. I remember doing our projects, and if the project wasn't as good as he thought it should be, he would make me redo it. I wasn't happy about it, but afterwards it turned out a lot better, I was glad that he made me redo it,: said Weiss. "I use what he taught us every day in my job and attribute my woodworking skills to his teaching. He was truly a craftsman."

Jim Newman commented, "I was very sorry to hear about Mr. Wagner's passing. He was a wonderful man, and a true Master Carpenter. I feel

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privileged to have been one of his students. He will be greatly missed."

Bill's lifelong devotion to helping young people wasn't just limited to teaching Carpentry at Ranken. He was equally active with the Boy Scouts, his Church and other organizations where he was able to share his life experiences. While he was a leader in the Boy Scouts, Bill produced 56 Eagle Scouts, more than any other troop leader in the area. In 1984, Bill received the Silver Beaver Award, the highest award that a local council can present to a volunteer scouter.

At age 92, Bill's memory was as sharp as ever and he had a lot of stories to tell, some chronicled in the black and white photos he carried around with him. He and his wife, Ruby, continued to live in the South County neighborhood where they raised their two sons, Dennis and David (deceased) in the home that Bill built. Bill continued to remain active until earlier this year when he fell and broke his hip. But until that time, Bill and Ruby attended almost every Ranken alumni event where he usually ran into one or two of his former students.

Ruby, also 92 continues to be active staying with their son Dennis, his wife, Marilyn, and their daughter, Stacey. Bill and Ruby have two granddaughters, and twin great-grandsons. Bill's legacy will live on through his students but most importantly his presence, spirit and tales of the 40 years in Carpentry at Ranken.
